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SUNY PROFESSOR WEAVES HISTORY, MURDER AND CAMPUS INTRIGUE INTO DEBUT NOVEL

Upstate New York is fictional setting for Cornflower's Ghost

When SUNY at Clinton Falls professor Peter Langley dies in an apparent drunk-driving accident, his teaching assistant Tom Flanagan becomes suspicious, knowing full well the professor didn't drink. Flanagan pursues the details of the accident while leading us on a journey through murder, campus politics, political deceit, and 200 years of upstate New York history. *Cornflower's Ghost: An Historical Mystery*, the debut novel by Thomas Pullyblank, will be released October 3, 2009 by Square Circle Press.

Set in a fictionalized upstate New York, the thriller is based on actual locations across the region. "I invented a university town and placed it in central New York along the south banks of the Mohawk River," said Pullyblank, a professor of history at the State University College at Oneonta and an Ordained Elder in the United Methodist Church. "Clinton Falls, its campus, local taverns and difficult winter weather, as well as the characters in the story, should all be recognizable to the residents and students of upstate New York."

Two prominent characters, Cornflower, an Iroquois woman, and Revolutionary War hero Theodorick Crane, are fictionalized mosaics of people who lived in central New York two hundred years ago. "The novel originated from a ghost story I told to a group of friends gathered at Collins Lake in Scotia over a decade ago." Pullyblank, a lifelong resident of upstate, found it natural to write about the people and places he knows. "Upstate New York is one of those places that deserves to be written about because of our unique and interesting heritage, and because of the fascinating characteristics of its people." The novel also contains important scenes set in the Thousands Islands, along the St. Lawrence River.

The drama involving the historical characters becomes integral to the life and death of the fictional professor, as he was closely tied to the descendants of Theodorick Crane. The modern-day characters of an ambitious university administrator and her Congressman husband employ political manipulation to try and create an upstate resort park based on the patriots of the Revolutionary War. "Through the characters of Martha and Harold Radisson, I wanted to address the question of how our past should or should not be used to address contemporary concerns. At that heart of that plot line is the state of the upstate economy," explained Pullyblank. "It firmly places the question of heritage tourism in front of the reader."

A major sub-plot to the story is the campus politics surrounding the protagonist Tom Flanagan. "I witnessed some interdepartmental intrigue when I was a student at the University at Albany," Pullyblank said. "I was completely fascinated by how the whole situation began, developed, and was eventually resolved. The campus politics, the events portrayed, and indeed the whole story are well-anchored in historical reality."

After grieving the loss of his parents and brother, graduate student Tom Flanagan returns from a lengthy sabbatical to his winter-locked SUNY upstate campus to begin life anew in the spring semester, only to learn of the "accidental" death of his history professor, Peter Langley. Puzzled by the accounts of the accident, Tom is driven to pursue the facts of the case—and is immediately drawn into the intrigue surrounding another death—that of the Revolutionary War hero Theodorick Crane—Langley's obsession throughout his entire academic career. Putting his historical research skills to work, Tom pursues the two mysteries and soon becomes intimately involved with Crane's descendants: a manipulative college administrator, her even more manipulative Congressman husband, and their captivating niece—all of whom have vague former connections to Langley. Standing in the shadows behind it all is the ghost of Cornflower, an Iroquois woman executed for treason by Crane, who seems to be the key to unlocking the secrets of the past. But as the semester progresses and Tom delves deeper into

Langley's life and death, he and those close to him become tangled in a dangerous web of political ambition and academic deceit, the unraveling of which threatens to disrupt the lives of all involved.
